NEW INITIATIVE

Los Angeles African American Historic Places

GCI and Los Angeles City Planning, Office of Historic Resources have launched a new collaborative initiative, Los Angeles African American Historic Places, to identify, protect, and celebrate the city's Black heritage. The project provides the opportunity to rethink historic preservation policies and processes to better support social justice and equity goals and offers a potential model for future initiatives related to other communities in Los Angeles and beyond. A virtual roundtable of national and local thought leaders with experience in urban planning, historic preservation, African American history, and grassroots and community organizing was convened by GCI in December 2020. Their discussions of diversity and inclusion in preservation policy helped shape the project plan.





AATA Online now includes abstracts of audiovisual recordings from various sources and from journals such as the *Journal of Conservation Studies* (South Korea), *Restauro*, *Context*, and the *International Journal of Architectural Heritage*. Also covered are conference proceedings on integrated pest management, collections care in Southeast Asia, and from the ICON Textile Group.



New Additions to the Conservation Collection
