

Proceedings of a Symposium Herculaneum, Italy 23-27 September 2013

At this symposium, which used the archaeological site of Herculaneum as an open classroom, the MOSAIKON partners worked with the British School at Rome and the Herculaneum Conservation Project to bring together heritage professionals from the Mediterranean region, along with other international colleagues, to discuss issues and challenges related to



archaeological shelters.

The symposium proceedings are being made available to further the discourse regarding protective shelters for archaeological sites and to offer heritage practitioners guiding principles when faced with sheltering decisions.


Pia Gottschaller examining surface of Hermelindo Fiaminghi's *Seccionado no. 1*, 1958.

Arches

In May, the City of Lincoln Council launched ARCADE (Access Resource for Conservation and Archaeology in a Development Environment), a dynamic and powerful web-based system that categorizes, maps, and describes the rich cultural heritage of the City of Lincoln, England.

ARCADE is an Arches-Version-4-powered historic environment record system created by Lincoln in partnership with the GCI and



Historic England. The publicly-accessible database showcases the diversity of the city's long history from Roman times to the present and will help guide city efforts to protect and preserve its cultural heritage.



Microfadeometry

In March 2018, GCI hosted an experts meeting on advancing the practice of microfader testing (MFT) in the cultural heritage field. One of the meeting's resolutions was to identify as many users of the MFT technique as possible to begin developing regional networks of MFT expertise around the world. Inside the Eames House with Eames Demetrios, Thomas Hines, and Susan Macdonald

The husband and wife team of Charles and Ray Eames produced some of the most iconic designs of the mid-twentieth century. This episode of the Getty podcast series covers a wide range of topics, from Charles and Ray's training and inspiration, to their collaborative design process, to the challenges of preserving and conserving modern architecture.



Recorded at the Eames's home and studio in the Pacific Palisades neighborhood of Los Angeles, this episode brings together in conversation Eames Demetrios, grandson of Charles and Ray Eames, director of the Eames Office, and chairman of the Eames Foundation; Thomas Hines, a renowned architectural historian; and Susan Macdonald, head of Buildings and Sites at the GCI.
