Bagan Conservation Project


The vast cultural landscape of Bagan contains over 3,500 ancient temples, pagodas, and monasteries in Myanmar. This sacred landscape was listed as a UNESCO World Heritage Site earlier this year. At a joint media event held November 6, the GCI and Myanmar's Department of Archaeology and National Museum announced a collaboration to protect and conserve this extraordinary site.

The project is part of Getty's Ancient Worlds Now: A Future for the Past, a new global initiative to promote a greater understanding of the need to protect and save the world's cultural heritage for future generations.

Managing Collections Environments Initiative (MCE)

GCI scientists Naoki Fujisawa and Michał Łukomski have developed a method to address problems associated with the use of nanoindentation near the edge of a small object with a rough surface, encountered in a variety of research fields, including heritage conservation. Nanoindentation is one of the primary techniques scientists are investigating at the Institute in the effort to precisely identify the conditions under which irreversible damage occurs in cultural heritage materials as a result of climatic agents of deterioration. This research is a component of MCE.

Sidney Nolan (1917–1992) is renowned for an oeuvre ranging from views of Melbourne's seaside suburb St. Kilda to an iconic series on outlaw hero Ned Kelly. With little regard for the longevity of his work, he began to exploit materials such as boot polish, dyes, secondhand canvas, tissue paper, old photographs, and commercial and household paints, as well as equally innovative use of nitrocellulose, alkyds, and other diverse materials.

This is the sixth book in our Artist's Materials series, which publishes in-depth research into the materials and techniques of significant twentieth- and twenty-first-century artists.


Call for Expression of Interest
