Conservation of the Eames House Project Receives Award

The Eames House Conservation Management Plan (CMP)—the development of which was led by the GCI—received the Inventory/Survey Award of Excellence at the 2020 Modernism in America Awards held by DOCOMOMO US.

Recognized for its "detailed, sensitive and research-based approach," the CMP "uses a values-based conservation planning methodology to emphasize the significance of intangible values as well as physical aspects of the place. It takes a holistic approach, analyzing the entire site and all of its elements and components."



As part of the same awards program, the GCI's <u>Conserving Modern Architecture Initiative</u> and the Getty Foundations's Keeping it Modern grant program received a Special Citation.

Repairing Damaged Acrylic


