The Restoration of Paintings in Paris, 1750–1815: Practice, Discourse, Materiality

The decades following the 1973 publication of Alessandro Conti's Storia del Restauro have seen considerable scholarly interest in the development of restoration in France in the second half of the eighteenth century. A number of technical treatises and biographies of restorers have offered insight into restoration practice. This publication is the first book to situate this work within the broader historical and philosophical contexts of the time and provides a valuable new framework for conservators, conservation scientists, and art historians working with paintings from this period.


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

From the Archives: Tomb of Nefertari

The Tomb of Nefertari project records consist of files from the GCI's collaboration with the Supreme Council of Antiquities (formerly the Egyptian Antiquities Organization) to conserve the wall paintings in the tomb of Nefertari in the Valley of the Queens, in Luxor, Egypt. Records date from 1984 to 1996 and document project planning, condition assessments, scientific analyses, conservation treatment, environmental monitoring, graphic documentation, site protection planning, and conservation training.
