The Program in Latin American Studies (PLAS) is pleased to announce Visiting Scholars and Artists from Puerto Rico (VISAPUR) 2019!

Once again, the Program in Latin American Studies (PLAS) is seeking to host members of the academic and artistic communities of Puerto Rico as visitors in summer 2019. This effort aims to provide relief to scholars, students, and artists by allowing them to continue their work at Princeton on a temporary basis. The visitors program provides a range of support including a stipend to cover living expenses, access to libraries and other scholarly resources, and an opportunity to engage with colleagues at Princeton. This initiative will be hosted by Princeton's Program in Latin American Studies (PLAS) with additional support from the Department of Spanish and Portuguese, and the Office of the Provost.

Visiting Scholars and Artists

PLAS invites scholars and artists from Puerto Rico to apply to be a visiting faculty scholar or artist during the summer of 2019 (for one month in June or July). Selected faculty will be granted the status of Visiting Fellow and selected artists will be granted the status of Visiting Professional Specialist or Visiting Fellow. Princeton University will provide a stipend to cover lodging, meals, local transportation, and roundtrip airfare. Faculty scholars may bring with them one graduate student who will also be given a stipend and access to scholarly resources. All fields of research will be considered. Faculty members, scholars, and graduate students will be assigned offices in the PLAS. We will also seek studio space for artists. Individuals will be appointed to specific visiting ranks based upon education and qualifications.

Applications will be reviewed on a rolling basis until available slots are filled.

Application Requirements for Scholars

- 1. Apply online.
- 2. Recommendation letter from a senior faculty colleague, department chair, and/or dean.
- 3. A two-page description in English of your research project, including an indication of the nature of the resources to be used while at the University and specification of the faculty member(s) with whom you wish to work (to start, you may want to review the list of PLAS faculty affiliates).
- 4. Your full curriculum vitae (CV)
- 5. CV of graduate student, if applicable
- 6. A one-page statement in English on your understanding of the role you may play in the reconstruction of Puerto Rico upon your return, especially with regard to the future of your academic institution.

Note for faculty: Please note that, if selected, you will join Princeton with the status of a Visiting Fellow. This rank is intended for full-time faculty at an outside institution who will continue their faculty position at their home university after their term is complete. As such, you will be required to provide a letter verifying your current position and supporting salary/benefits at your home institution as a pre-requisite for entering this program. This does not apply to artists.

Application Requirements for Artists

- 1. Apply online.
- 2. A letter of reference.
- 3. Your full curriculum vitae (CV).
- 4. A one-page description in English of your artistic project, including an indication of how your project is related to the crisis in Puerto Rico or how your project will support the reconstruction of Puerto Rico upon your return.

For full consideration, please apply by March 1.

Princeton Arts Fellowship - Open to early-career artists whose achievements have been recognized as demonstrating extraordinary promise. Princeton Arts Fellows spend two consecutive academic years (September 1-July 1) at Princeton University and formal teaching is expected.

Deadline: every September

Hodder Fellowship - Open to artists demonstrating "much more than ordinary intellectual and literary gifts." Fellowships are for one academic year and provide the opportunity to pursue an independent project. No teaching is required.

The Humanities Council welcomes 13 long-term visiting fellows and 12 short-term visiting fellows to Princeton University for the academic year. Chairs of humanities departments along with interdisciplinary programs and committees under the Council's umbrella jointly nominated scholars from around the world. Long-term visiting fellows will teach one course during the fall or spring semester. Short-term visiting fellows traditionally participate in lectures, classes, colloquia and informal discussions for an intensive three- to five-day visit.

Visiting Fellowships - The Program invites college and university professors and other professionals with established records of scholarship to apply for appointments as Visiting Fellows for the academic year. One-semester appointments are possible but not preferred. Among the research fellowships offered are the Ann and Herbert W. Vaughan Visiting Fellowship and the William E. Simon Visiting Fellowship in Religion and Public Life.

The Program also invites applications for the Garwood Teaching Fellowship. The Garwood Teaching Fellowship can be for one semester or the academic year. Garwood Teaching Fellows teach at least one undergraduate course in the Department of Politics on statesmanship and presidential leadership, subject to sufficient enrollment and approval of the Dean of the Faculty.

Postdoctoral Research Associate Fellowships – Early-career scholars without ongoing positions, who have recently received their Ph.D. degree, may apply for fully funded, 12-month Postdoctoral Research Associate appointments for the year, with the option of renewal for an additional academic year, contingent on good performance. Applicants are expected to be in residence for the duration of the appointment, and are expected to devote full time to their proposed research.

Rockefeller Visiting Fellowship program – supports fellows in diverse academic areas for one year in residence at Princeton to research and write about topics involving human values in public and private life. The program is open to scholars in all disciplines provided their research plans qualify. The fellowship period extends from September 1 to July 1.
