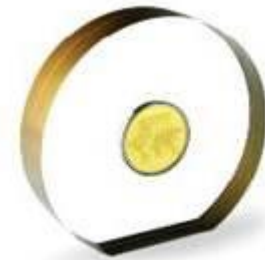

The Lee Kuan Yew World City Prize is a biennial international award that honours outstanding achievements and contributions to the creation of liveable, vibrant and sustainable urban communities around the world.

The Prize is awarded to cities and recognises their key leaders and organisations for displaying foresight, good governance and innovation in tackling the many urban challenges faced, to bring about social, economic and environmental benefits in a holistic way to their communities.



We are pleased to announce **Prof Wulf Daseking** as the new member of the Nominating Committee of the Lee Kuan Yew World City Prize. He replaces the late Sir Peter Hall (1932 – 2014) in the Nominating Committee.

Prof Daseking is the former Chief Planning Officer for the City of Freiburg, Germany, and has over 30 years of experience in city planning. He is well versed in regional planning, urban development, landscape planning, implementation of urban projects from conception to completion, and urban design. He has also advocated the development of dense, heterogeneous cities, transit oriented developments (TODs), decentralised urban development and cities of short distances that enjoy social equilibrium and differentiated citizen participation. He is currently a Professor at the University of Freiburg since 2010.

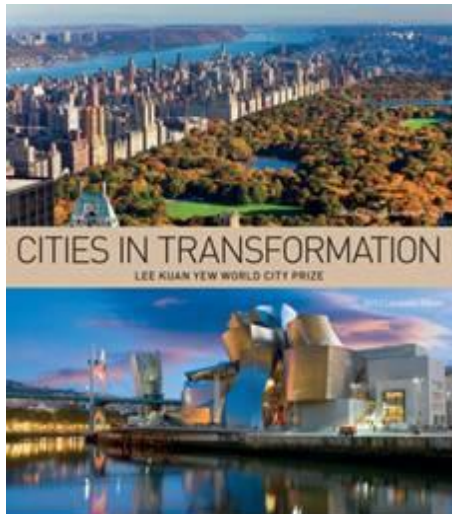
