I'm leading a research project focused on the relationship between characteristics of the built environment and affordability and risk of displacement in historically African-American neighborhoods. This project is part of the National Trust for Historic Preservation's African-American Cultural Heritage Action Fund. We're operating on a tight timeframe--aiming to start and finish the project by the end of the year-so we're seeking a support from a full-time researcher through December 2018. Ideal candidates will have experience and expertise related to planning and African-American communities. We'd like the position to be based in Seattle, but we'll consider candidates working remotely. An RFP for the position is attached and is also available here. I think this could be a great position for someone in the dissertation stage or a recent Ph.D., but we'll consider candidates with a master's degree or less if they have research experience. Short turnaround on this: We're aiming to review proposals starting 3/14 and have work begin shortly thereafter.

Please don't let the formality of the RFP scare you. We'll work with interested candidates to get them through the submission process if folks find it unfamiliar or intimidating.
