

Design for decline: how shrinking cities are saving themselves

In several countries across the world, the woes of urbanisation are going hand-in-hand with a much less documented challenge: the problem of cities shrinking due to low fertility rates, sunset industries and resource depletion.

To combat issues such as hollowed-out neighbourhoods and excessive infrastructure that is too expensive to maintain, cities are relocating residents, downsizing their environs, pivoting to sunrise industries and trying other strategies.




