

The New Voices Fellows program, funded by the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, is a year-long media skills, communication and leadership program for professionals from the developing world. Previous fellows include entrepreneurs, government officials, or advocates, see profiles from the 2013, 2014, or 2015 classes for examples of the types of candidates that have participated. One of the 2014 fellows, Jamila Abass, was mentioned by President Obama during his trip to Kenya in July, saying

'I'm hopeful because of a young woman named Jamila Abass. So Jamila founded Mfarm, which is a mobile platform that is already used by over 14,000 people across Kenya. Mfarm makes it easy for farmers to get information that lets them match their crops with what the market demands. And studies show that it can help farmers double their sales."

As part of the 2016 fellowship program, in addition to recruiting fellows working across the development sector, the Aspen Institute is specifically looking for fellows with specializations in food security, vaccines/polio, and development policy and finance. Successful candidates for the fellowship will have a record of professional achievement and a desire to share their perspectives on global development with an international audience.
